It used to be said that the problem (one of them...) with the C of E was that you had Guardian readers preaching to Telegraph readers! I'm reminded of the quote from Mark

Twain: "Never discuss politics or religion in polite company. Save those discussions for respectful company."

It could be said that the church family gathering Sunday by Sunday is a rather polite affair – we're all terribly conscious of being on our best behaviour for God – and accordingly we put on our best Sunday suit for the soul. This 'polite company' can become an all too safe and introspective space concerned primarily with 'churchianity' with little thought for the reality of our religious commitment to live intentionally and expectantly for God's Kingdom to come on earth as it is in heaven.

Recently, I attended a public consultation on the vexed issue of traffic in our villages. As with most meetings like this, it attracted the more invested, both for and against. I would describe the meeting as informative but 'scrappy'. It all got a bit 'binary' with the yaes and the naes facing off and getting more and more irritated with the process and each other. The issue that was to be discussed '20 is plenty' seemed, in principle, to be a reasonable response and, with the limited options available to the community, one which could help to alleviate some of the problems we're all too aware of. Ironically, it felt that the principle was lost in the consultation. Personally, I'd give it a go.

As I sat in the meeting, wearing my blackest clerical shirt, I was encouraged to see other members of the St Mary's Storrington Church family. As a church we make a claim to be a source of 'faith, hope and love at the heart of our village'. It's a powerful, outward looking strap line and a vision that has the potential to be lived out with real impact through our mission.

However, it may mean that we have to be a less polite company as we speak to what we believe are the priorities of God's kingdom and lifestyles that will lead to the fullness of life we have in Jesus. Importantly, Mark Twain helps us to remember that the means we use should always be 'of the kingdom' and a sign of our deep respect for the value of all the folk in our community.

I've been left reflecting on what it means to be 'at the heart of our community'. As I write early copy for the August 3 Heralds, I'm really excited that I will have been sharing with Christians across the village in the LOVE STORRINGTON initiative the week of 21 July.

I hope and pray all churches will be able to share in this as part of their mission. We are all called to make known in our worship, work and witness the good news of the Christ-life. Dare we believe that when we are next called to pray on a Sunday morning it will be what the great 20th century Swiss theologian Karl Barth believed it to be?

A committed and active member of her community, Helen gave her time generously to causes close to her heart. She delivered library books





Idle travel

I have a book called *The Idle Traveller*, but it's not really about travelling idly; more accurately it's about travelling slowly. It's about taking time to notice little things as you pass through an area. Travelling idly, or slowly, really fits in with my eco-minded life; we've just returned from a holiday cycling from Amsterdam to Bruges. We took six days to travel 160 miles or so, which in a car could be achieved in something like three hours.



Actually, to get there we first went very, very fast. We took the Eurostar train. I'm not sure why it's taken us over 30 years to try Eurostar. It was a first-time experience for both of us, and so painless. We got a train direct to St Pancras from Billingshurst, and then through security onto Eurostar, and about three hours later we were in Amsterdam. So much nicer, and I think greener. I read that Eurostar emits 90% fewer carbon substances than a short haul aircraft. We can plan that Paris trip to see the rebuilt Notre Dame with a clear conscience.

Anyway, back to slow travelling. Our great adventure was made possible by joining a floating hotel. Each morning, we got onto our bikes, and cycled, and later in the day rejoined our boat wherever it had

got to as it made its way along the canals. There were about forty of us on board; while the boat's carbon footprint would not have been zero, that's at least twenty fewer cars on the road. Chatting to our fellow travellers, we all felt we'd had a brilliant few days.

It was completely refreshing to be in countries where cycling is absolutely normalised. Everyone cycles! In all the towns the main roads had separate cycle lanes,



and large areas for parking your bike. Bruges and Amsterdam even have underground cycle garages, although I think the ultimate nightmare might be forgetting where you parked your bike in a bike park that accommodates 600. The paths along the canals were delightful to use. And we had every opportunity to stop and stare at details. A gem that would have been missed in a car was a strawberry vending machine. It was at the entrance to a strawberry farm; polytunnels with thousands of strawberry plants being grown commercially. You paid your money and selected the size of punnet you wanted, and the machine delivered it to you, just like a chocolate bar but healthier.



Hope for our trees



One thing I noticed was that the species of tree that lined the Dutch and Belgium streets and along the canals is the elm. I'm of a generation that barely remembers English elms, but I know that there are pockets of elm around the UK that showed resistance to Dutch elm disease. Similarly, I heard on the radio this morning that there are ash trees showing resistance to ash dieback. Nature is more resilient than we think. Another snippet from the morning news was that the UK is not

meeting its tree planting targets. I have to say the news that we even had tree planting targets had washed over me. However now I know, I shall be doing my bit come the autumn when it's good to plant trees.

Rubbish

Not really rubbish but recycling. I got an email from West Sussex County Council inviting me to participate in a survey about recycling. Quite a few of the questions concerned whether I am confident I know what items can be put into the recycling bins (blue topped) and which must be taken to the tips for recycling there. I think I know, but then again the labels on some things don't help. For a future column I shall do some research and try to decode some common symbols. You may still be able to complete the survey by putting West Sussex Recycling Survey into a search engine.

Both Holland and Belgium appeared to be on top of recycling. In our hotel in Bruges there was a notice in the bedroom saying something like "Please put your waste paper, bottles and drinks cans onto the desk in your room, and we will sort it and ensure it goes into the correct recycling bin." Excellent!

THAKEHAM GARDENERS' CLUB



Club members enjoyed a talk from Elizabeth Sawday of Apuldram Roses in June.

She told us the nursery was started by her mother-in-law who was also instrumental in the setting up of the Hampton Court Flower Show prior to RHS taking it over. This lady had started with a farm shop and when that business started to decline decided she would grow roses. Elizabeth said it was a very hands-on occupation and physically very hard work. She explained the various types of roses of which she'd brought examples to show us and explained the differences. She also showed us how to read the plant labels so you knew which breeder the rose came from.



Growers such as herself are becoming fewer; at one time they were over 100 growers in the UK but that is now down to 40, and the number of roses grown was once 60,000 but now down to no more than 18,000. She said growers, such as herself, had to pay breeders rights to grow their roses and these costs

had increased dramatically to over £3 per plant.

Some of the various rose types are hybrid tea, floribunda, rambler, climbing, bush, patio and ground cover, which all need different pruning methods. What she really stressed was the importance of watering and feeding which affects the health of the rose and its resistance to black spot. She also emphasised that granular feed should be watered in not just sprinkled around the rose. Regular deadheading is also essential, not just nipping off the head but going down to the 5th leaf emergence. A product she mentioned was Sulphur Rose which helps deter black spot, rust and aphids. Roses like to have a little space around them so don't plant companion plants too close to a rose base and never use wood ash or bark chips near roses.

This was an extremely informative and enjoyable talk and Elizabeth was warmly thanked. The Club is paying a visit to her nursery later in the month which participating members are looking forward to.

The meeting on **11 August** is when Jacqui Aviolet will explain about Greek/Latin plant names in her talk *Botanically Speaking*. The Club competition is a Vase of Summer Flowers.



He has been married to Helen for 36 years and they have four children: Andrew, Michael, Louise and Richard.



STORRINGTON CONSERVATION SOCIETY

The majority of us are meat eaters, grateful to farmers who produce our favourite cuts of meat. However, a visit to the supermarket or a glance at a restaurant menu show more and more vegetarian dishes are now being made available. The term vegetarian was probably first used in reference to a school in London in 1838 and used by the Vegetarian Society in Manchester in 1847. But vegetarianism is far from new; for example, it was practised in the 9th Century BCE by Jainists in India. Today, parts of many countries, especially in India, are totally vegetarian.

There are well-known degrees of vegetarianism. Vegan, and many others less strict, such as those which allow eggs or fish. Faith and health have always been among the reasons for a veggie diet, but now climate concern is another. Many studies show cattle farming produces much more methane (a major greenhouse gas) than arable. So what are concerned meat eaters to do? One option is to stop eating meat, hard for those who enjoy a well-cooked roast! Another is to choose to eat less meat, perhaps to have one or more days a week as veggie days. Or maybe to choose a veggie meal when eating out. There are many good recipe books that describe tasty non-meat dishes for home cooking. Note that dairy products are not very climate friendly.

A balanced diet is good for our health, so a strict veggie diet relies on food like nuts, pulses and quinoa for protein. (Dietary advice is available if needed). Veggie eating is a way of reducing our carbon footprint, earning Brownie points. Give it a try if not already doing so.

Our work party met on 5 July at Hurston Warren SSSI, removing invasive bracken to benefit the heathland. Balsam bashing this year in various locations in June and July showed last year's efforts were effective in reducing the spread. Good news.

We next meet on **2 August at 10am** at Dyke Farm, West Chiltington Road, meadow hay raking and weeding the hedge trees planted last year, the aim to provide for small mammals and birds. Gardening clothes and gloves are suggested, other equipment is provided. Working in the open air makes the break for a cup of coffee at half time well earned. Come and join us, and do share transport for more Brownie points.

STORRINGTON HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY

At the June meeting we had the pleasure of Elizabeth Sawday from Apuldram Rose nursery speaking to us about roses. Elizabeth said the nursery now produces between 15 – 18 thousand roses a year varying in type from hybrid tea, shrub, patio miniatures, floribunda, damask, ground cover, floribunda, bush type, climbers and ramblers. The most fragrant roses are the older type of Damask which was originally used by monks centuries ago. The use then spread, being used for perfumes, rose oil, cooking and sweet making.

All the roses at Apuldram are grown from budding onto the root stock. This is done once a year; a talented budder will arrive and spend two or three weeks bent over budding several thousand rose bushes. He is accompanied by a patcher who follows him along the rows securing each new graft. The grafting buds are meticulously prepared by Elizabeth, her mother-in-law and maybe a third person. This is done by cutting a rose with a good stem, and the flower is discarded along with all the leaves, leaving just a bare stem with four buds; this is now called a stick. Then each stick must have every thorn removed so that the budder does not have problems. The sticks have to be very carefully labelled so the correct bloom will develop.

Elizabeth then answered many questions from the floor and said that roses that are well looked after, with water and feed, are more resistant to rose problems, especially black spot.


The evening finished with a raffle and light refreshments.




STORRINGTON PRIMARY SCHOOL

STORRINGTON & SULLINGTON - REFLECTIONS OF THE PAST

REVD HENRY PALMER AT SULLINGTON - PART 38

So, for Mr Palmer, it was back to his parish and picking up where he left it in the hands of his "locum" before his continental tour of a whole month. It was Sunday, and he was pleased with "two very decent congregations in the morning – H.C. 12 attended, which was very refreshing to me after my travels, especially in the afternoon. G.C.G. lunched and we walked and discussed the school." It was arranged that the Rector would see the Inspector of the district as a preliminary step. Then he had to get down to paperwork, accounts, inspections and visiting where some of his traveller's tales astonished his parishioners who, of course, never left their own parish.

The cattle murrain was a main topic of conversation: "it had even come to our gates." The wider news was of the Fenian Conspiracy in Ireland, "being hunted out by the Government... seems to have been a rising in Ireland fanned and supported by the Irish in America."

Cricket, of course, had not vanished from the Rector's social engagements. G.C.G. held his harvest home, "about 30 men and women, early dinner, cricket match (truly rural and extreme fun), and races, cheese rolling..." The start of October also marked the arrival of his fourth pupil, Garfitt, "he seems a gentlemanly quiet fellow, father a banker at Boston." The first day's work with him found him "dull, working up his matriculation subjects." There was news of another new pupil, Mr Grant Dalton wrote about his son whom he wished to send to Mr Palmer, who met the newcomer at Portsmouth in due course. He was soon hard at work with them, and with his sick visiting and regular reading to housebound parishioners.

Family news came in a letter from Jane Veasey at Lowestoft, that Annie, who seemed to be subject to bouts of ill health, had again been seriously ill with quinsy, followed by the doctor being quite alarmed by a threat of diphtheria. "I fear she is much weakened in constitution. My mother fears the winter for her here" although by the time of Jane's letter she was much improved. The pupils were apparently not an easy proposition. "G.D. seems a regular unbacked colt and I will find that Xmas will come to me none too soon." This was after the first day's hard work with "my cubs". Later, he had to talk to G.D. about his manners which he took very well, "he certainly has an element of goodness in him which I must endeavour to work upon." There was sad news from Stopham that dear Miss Smyth had died, and the Rector attended her funeral. "She was 91 and had lived a long life without any cares, yet without idleness, for she worked and thought and prayed for the good of others. The rain came down most perseveringly and the walk from the house to the church was rather dismal – but as the vault opened into the building there was no further exposure. Brown read the service well and afterwards I spoke to him about the night school."

The following day, he rode to Poynings to catch the School Inspector, Mr Koe, but just missed him as he had left a mere half hour before! Not one to waste a journey, the rector had a nice interview with Mr Holland (the rector there) and inspected the church which he described as "cruciform of which the east window is a curious mixture of perpendicular and decorated." He enjoyed his ride there as George had kindly loaned him Comet, who went nicely.

Mr Palmer's friend Barrie Clayton was visiting and he and his pupils went to "view the boat", finding "the waters much out in view of the heavy rains." The weather was bad for his poor old visitor, but they managed a walk in the afternoon. The rain and high wind of October was causing problems. "This equinoxial weather floods us. We could get neither to stable nor yard except under a foot of water". October 30th – "the rain iterumque! We are all wearying of this weather but get through it pretty well." By the beginning of November, "the month has begun well with the weather... took G.D. to Pulborough, where we were disappointed in a regular row, but got a tub of Brand's and went floating about over hedges and ditches for miles. The waters are 3' in most places." [This was in 1865 – not 2022!]

At last as the weather turned and "we a-ratting with the Ballards. We killed 60 in the barn in the afternoon and the men 30 in the morning, and nearly got 2 rabbits from under the faggot stack." The other matter occupying the Rector's mind was the schools project. "My school question came up at the Board today. I had strong support in Gibson and Napier whilst farmers generally were for the <u>status quo</u>. [Schoolchildren were a useful pool of labour at busy times – harvest, beaters for shooting, as the school logs reveal.] They grant the night school room, but must refer all else to the Central Board."

"Has been a refreshing day qua weather – took a parish round and explained to the perturbed Mr Moase [master of the workhouse] the prospects of the night school... he didn't seem to see it at all." "Had a cheerful [Sunday] day: Holy Communion with fair attendance (16) and a thoroughly good congregation in the afternoon, to whom I preached on the subject of Death [a cheerful subject indeed!] being moved thereto by the death of Miss Smyth, Lord Palmerston, James Wood and Gatton, friends, neighbours, a hero and add to this the beautiful dying year..."

Winter – and the Clothing Club found Mr Palmer on his parish rounds distributing Club tickets, taking "the Prim Harrovian with him to Cobden" a salutary part of his education to show how the poor lived, and the contrast to his pupil's privileged life.

The post brought news of Annie's illness, "the doctor will send his opinion soon" and a summons from Charlie [Charlotte King] for Emmie "on a mysterious errand". There were dispatches from parlourmaids which needed to be replied to, so the Rector preached two old sermons for the 22nd Sunday after Trinity. It is interesting to note that at this time there was postal delivery on Sundays. The next day "Emmie goes on her secret expedition." Mr Palmer, meanwhile, went off to Horsham in a carriage full: Knight of Washington, Beck and Garfitt. The other cub to his fat aunt at Worthing.

The ceremony was eminently successful, commencing at 12 o'clock it continued till 3.15pm. The church is most elaborately restored, the whole seeming to be done regardless of expense. The peculiarities of the building lies in its being without a chancel, one great aisle extends from W to E. The E window being a mighty perpendicular structure, filled with rather gaudy and hot glass by O'Connor – the W wall over the belfry is frescoed with a painting of the Last Supper and another subject I could not well make out. The roof is open oak very richly (over?) painted – the two side aisles on either side are very effective with their handsome openwork roofs. The service was given very well: all choral – proper lessons from 2 Sam.xxii and Rev.xxi..." "Hymns A and M. The Bishop of Oxford, who tho' over-theatrical and weak in voice, was not quite heard at times, preached a fine sermon from Exodus xxv from "And there I will meet with thee and I will commune with thee". "We returned before the lunch which was to be at 3 or 4."

The next day Mr Palmer had a funeral causing him to meditate on "the strange procession of clerk, parson, and corpse, as we walked out together down into the furthest corner of the new ground." Later, a social engagement – a dinner at Highden given by Sir Charles Goring, where he went with G.C.G, his sister Bertha, and met the Whitings, Ballards and Capt. Sewell among others. It was here (it seems that the Rector was unprepared and not forewarned) that "G.C.G. declared his suit and I am most vexed but we could not prevent it, when there were 10 to 1 against us - all the family strong in force." It seems a very discourteous action on the part of his friend G.C.G. to make the announcement in front of neighbours, leaving the Rector unaware of his intentions, or apparently of the matter itself. The next day G.C.G. "again pays us a long visit: things look coming to a head. I cannot do otherwise than give my consent. My approval, never!" Bertha came to stay at the Rectory, "in the absence of her brother gone a-courting". The young squire moved things along quickly. The Rector and Bertha rode to visit friends, to Washington and Highden. "G.C.G. declares the thing settled and is ecstatic accordingly.

My mother declares that she can never get through it". "I salute Bertha [Greek word] on speaking to her about this engagement." The following week G.C.G. goes a-courting and leaves intelligence with all his friends. What will they say of him? And what of us?" "Bertha, Garfitt and I walk to Storrington, call on the Whitings to whom "it is no news." "George [G.C.G.] was unfortunate in his one day visit and could not get even to Major Sandham [weather] who has written two remarkably heartfelt notes on the matrimonial subject, tho' it is felt that G's choice must have disappointed them. G.C.G. dines and Feb 1 or Jan 25, Thursdays both, will be the day", and next, "G.C.G. comes in this evening and reports that the day will be fixed bye and bye when E. comes home. Shd I object to publishing the banns? Certainly not." Emmy returned on December 9, met by her brother, the Rector, at Pulborough, "in fine feather and comes laden with letters." "G.C.G. courting lives on love and tea."



THE WINEWS SULLINGTON WINDMILLS

The Sullington Windmills WI held their monthly meeting on 18 June, with around 30 members attending. The speaker was Amber, a Project Support Officer from the Sussex Dolphin Project, which was launched in 2018 to build a connection with local communities.

She told our members about the three main species of dolphins that can be found in and around our coast: the Bottlenose dolphin, the Common dolphin and the White Beaked dolphin. We can also see Harbour Porpoises in our local waters. The project began gathering data, using information on sightings from local people in 2022 in order to monitor the types and numbers of dolphins in Sussex.

She highlighted the problem that the so-called supertrawlers cause for the dolphin population as they often get caught up in the huge nets and then die and end up washed up on beaches.

People can join the project to act as watchers, either on land or sea. See the Sussex Dolphin Project Facebook page.



WEATHER WATCH

After England's warmest and sunniest spring, June 2025 had a lot to live up to. And it did for when the month ended the Met Office announced that across England it had turned out the warmest on record. In our district, though I registered a slightly warmer June in 2023 and taking in the UK as whole, this continues to hold the top spot for the warmest June.

June 2025 was another very sunny month, and it was drier than average. I recorded 21 days with no measurable rain. The air pressure was above par too and in summer this tends to lead to clear skies with plenty of sunshine. On the day of the Summer Solstice, the 21st, I recorded a maximum temperature at Heath Common of 29°C and in London it reached 33.4°C, the warmest temperature for this date in our national record.

The month began with a fine day, and I had a pleasant walk through the towering pine woods on Sullington Warren with the dappled sunlight filtering through to the forest floor. But the month did have a couple of stormy moments and one of them provided quite a shock to some residents of nearby Pulborough. On Saturday 7th a band of heavy



showers moved across our area and gave a spell of torrential rain with some lightning and claps of thunder. However, in the Rivermead area of Pulborough a tornado formed over the Pulborough Brooks and swept in from the southwest, a typical direction for tornadoes in the UK. It snapped the tops off some tall willow trees, felled fences and toppled smaller trees and debris was strewn along streets and gardens. It was classified as a T2 tornado on the TORRO Scale which meant that winds could have reached 70 to 90 mph.

Tornadoes favour a flat landscape to form on and Pulborough Brooks was ideal, and the atmosphere was particularly unstable on the 7th. They are more common than we realise, and we have more tornadoes per square mile than any other country in the world, with the exception of Holland.

On Friday 13th severe thunderstorms formed over a very hot France and moved north into the Channel, but they quickly died down in intensity and gave only a distant rumble of thunder for us and a couple of millimetres of rain. The rest of the month was warm or hot with



less than 5mm of rain falling so the monthly total of 35.3mm was only around 60 per cent of the average. Conditions were perfect on the 29th when I visited Findon Place when it opened its gardens to the public as part of the National Garden Scheme for Charity. Their lavenders looked particularly happy as it originates from the Mediterranean and thrives in hot, sunny conditions. Will July continue in similar mode? See next month's Weather Watch.


