When I was a Mental Health Chaplain one of the problems I was challenged with was that of forgiveness.

I frequently talked with people who had been hurt, physically, spiritually and emotionally, by being abused as children or young people. Many of them wrestled with their inability to forgive their abuser and also found their inability to forgive increased their

feelings of worthlessness and guilt.

Abuse, of course, is not just something that happens between an adult and a child, and is not always sexual or physical; there are many different aspects to it but whatever form a person may have suffered it can leave very deep scars. In such a situation, who would find it possible to forgive? It is very difficult to forgive someone who has no sense of guilt and who may feel no need of forgiveness, and who, in the same situation would do exactly the same thing again.

For those who have an understanding of the love of God, there is a way forward and that is to hand the problem to God to deal with. As Her Majesty the Queen wrote at Christmas 2011, "God sent into the world a unique person neither a philosopher nor a General (important as they are), but a Saviour, with the power to forgive It is in forgiveness that we feel the power of God's love."

What we cannot do, God, loving every one of us, can. His power to forgive is unique because he alone, "knows all the secrets of our hearts": he alone can see deep into a person's being and perceive their whole story. He alone can understand why a person behaves as they do. He alone can truly know if that person is worthy of forgiveness.

"Father, I place into your hands the things that I can't do. Father, I place into your hands the things that I've been through....."

If you are wrestling with an inability to forgive someone, don't beat yourself up about it, don't allow that person to hurt you even more; the problem is God's as well as yours, let him deal with it. With his help, lay it at his feet and get on with living your life free from the sense of guilt and responsibility that was never yours in the first place.



Public Transport – use it or lose it!

I am grateful to Simon Emerson, who is our intrepid Bus Correspondent, for his report of taking the bus up to Shipley. The accompanying pictures are from a cycling adventure we did with Simon and Ann in early May, passing many of the places Simon mentions: Shipley Windmill and Church, and the Tamworth pigs at Knepp.

Inspired by Simon, when I wanted to go to the Dulwich Picture Gallery the following week, I took the train to Clapham Junction and got a number 37 bus, half an hour through South London almost to the doors of the Gallery. Senior Railcard and Bus Pass – sorted!





From our Bus Correspondent - The Stork Express

Many readers will be aware of the rewilding project at Knepp which has resulted in incredible nature recovery among species such as nightingales and turtle doves as well as invertebrates. It is also the main base for the White Stork introduction project. This was featured on BBC1 Countryfile on 25 May, along with the Storrington Stork Festival with an appearance by Rev Jonathan. If you would like to visit Knepp you can add to your green credentials by catching the bus from Storrington. I think this should be marketed as the Stork Express. On Thursdays, Compass bus 74B leaves the bus stand behind Waitrose at 9.35am on a circuitous route to Horsham, via Thakeham and Shipley Village (see full timetable at compass-travel. co.uk). The bus normally leaves Storrington promptly and should arrive in Shipley at 9.48am. The return bus through Shipley is at 1.22pm. Signal clearly to the driver. This bus can be 10 minutes late.

If you get off in Shipley Village, after the Windmill and sharp bend, you



are on the Knepp Estate Red walking route. If you follow the Red route in a clockwise direction you will come to the Knepp Kitchen / café after less than an hour's walk. From the café the rest of the Red route back to Shipley is about 3.5 miles (without detours). The Knepp map can be found at https://knepp.co.uk/footpath-maps. But this map does not show all public footpath across the estate. In particular, it misses out the footpaths which cross the middle of this area linking to New Barn Farm, where the campsite and other activities are based. I would recommend looking at an OS map

in case you want to take a shorter route back to Shipley. If you are on Countrymen Lane intending to take the bridleway back to Shipley, which goes close to the windmill, you will see a West Sussex Council notice saying that the bridleway is closed due to the bridge over the River Adur being in disrepair. However, you can walk down the first part of this bridleway and Knepp have very helpfully provided a clearly marked diversion which brings you back to the lane near the windmill.

By the time you read this article the nightingales and cuckoos will have fallen silent but you might still hear the purring of turtle doves and there should be plenty of butterflies and storks flying.

As well as the hourly Stagecoach 1 bus (Worthing - Midhurst) and the Compass 100 bus (Henfield, Steyning, Pulborough, Billingshurst and beyond), Compass have two other services of value for countryside walking. On Tuesdays the 74 goes several times between Storrington and Horsham via West Chiltington and Barns Green and on Wednesdays the 71 makes a single journey to Chichester and back via Pulborough, Coldwaltham and Slindon.

I enjoy using buses for linear country walks, but there is also a serious point in encouraging greater use of these services. If many more people used these services just occasionally it might help viability and perhaps ensure their continuation for those who rely on them. The Older Persons Bus Pass gives you free travel after 9.30am. For others, the single ticket fares are capped at £3 until the end of the year.

Wildlife on my doorstep



Two or three years ago Sussex Wildlife Trust were offering free reptile mats and we asked for a couple. They are placed in a wilder area of the garden next to some steps that get full sun for much of the day. I also have planted troughs on the steps. So, last week I lifted one of the troughs to clear out tulips and replant it for the summer and look what I found! Slow worms are protected in UK law and are a priority species, meaning they're rare, endangered or declining.

PRESENTATION OF THE KING'S **AWARD** TO THE STORRINGTON AREA HELP SCHEME

The Lord-Lieutenant of West Sussex, Lady Emma Barnard, formally presented the Storrington Area Help Scheme with the King's Award for Voluntary Service at a recent ceremony held at the Old Workshop in Sullington, a few yards away from where the Scheme came into existence 52 years ago. Some 50 invited guests, mostly present and past volunteers, then celebrated with an excellent buffet tea to round off a memorable afternoon.



In presenting the crystal award accompanied by a certificate from the King, Lady Emma paid tribute to the Scheme and expressed her delight that it had been selected to receive this award which is the highest a voluntary group can receive in the UK. In reply, Tony Dell, Chair of the Trustees, thanked Lady Emma for her kind words and paid tribute to all the volunteers who, over the years, have provided such a valuable service that has had a deep impact on the wellbeing of the local community.



In 2024, the Storrington Area Help Scheme, a registered charity that covers Storrington, West Chiltington, Ashington, Washington and Thakeham, received just over 1000 calls for assistance. It helps people who live locally with no transport of their own to attend a range of healthcare appointments within West Sussex. The Scheme is run by a team of around 50 volunteers made up of office staff, operating weekday mornings from an office in the Trinity Centre in Storrington, and drivers, who use their own vehicles to provide transport to the healthcare appointments.

The Help Scheme is always keen to welcome new volunteers. Office staff are the key link between the clients and our volunteer drivers. They answer telephone calls from clients, liaise with drivers to check on availability and keep accurate handwritten records. Familiarisation training is provided for anyone interested in the role. Volunteer drivers do not have to give a regular commitment and as little as a few hours a month is perfectly acceptable. Drivers can always decline a journey request if inconvenient to them and can also specify the locations they are able to cover. A mileage allowance is paid and passengers are asked to make a contribution for the service they receive.

Our speaker at the May meeting was Amanda Millar, chairman of the Sussex Bat Group, who told us that bats, wildlife, plants and flowers were the love of her life.



She told us that worldwide there are about 1400 species of bats with 20% of those being fruit bats and the remainder insect feeders. There are about 18 species of resident British bats with Sussex

being home to more than any other county and the pipistrelle being the most common. With climate warming we are getting more migrants.


The aim of the Society is to protect our bats and their habitat and to raise public awareness. This is achieved by providing a rescue and care service for injured bats, a bat hospital, giving talks to groups, recording and monitoring the population of bats, providing bat boxes and protecting the areas where bats roost.

She told us bats have thumbs on the tips of their wings and that the fine delicate finger bones are joined by a thin membrane which is easily holed by being caught on something or cat clawed. These holes will mend. They have extremely sensitive hearing and their eyes only see in black and white. When their temperature is lowered to 6°C they become completely immobile and it takes 15 minutes for their

temperature to rise enough for them to move.

Bats are in trouble because there are fewer insects nowadays to feed on and they are losing their habitat due to changes in agriculture practise. Owls are a natural predator, they can be caught by cats, collide with cars or power lines, fly into wind turbines or glass buildings.

As gardeners, we can encourage bats by growing instant attracting plants that flower throughout



As her finale, Amanda lifted the covered cage she had brought with her and we were all able to see the three pipistrelle bats she had brought with her.

Amanda then answered our questions before being thanked for her excellent and enlightening talk.

The next meeting will be on **Monday 14 July** and our speaker will be Andrew Gaunt telling us about the *Role and Work of DEFRA Plant Quarantine Service*. There is no competition this month.

STORRINGTON CONSERVATION SOCIETY

On 5 May we were pleased to have a stall at the wonderful White Stork Festival, a great opportunity for like-minded conservationists and others to celebrate wildlife, especially the return of storks to the area. A number of the many people there showed interest in our work and becoming members. All very encouraging.



Healthy societies do not pollute lakes, rivers, streams, canals, other waterways and seashores. Not a new idea but one that has been ignored for far too long. Despite peaceful protest and much hand-wringing at the unlawful behaviour of our water companies and the inaction of Ofwat, little real progress has resulted. Though water company bosses are now to be held properly to account and plans for investment have been announced (hurrah), constant pressure is still needed to ensure real improvement is made. We can insist as we are having to pay for it. Remind our MPs.

Organised by Fund Britain's Waterways, just recently a 30-strong fleet of canal boats from all around the country cruised past the Houses of Parliament. They were drawing attention to the need for the government to act urgently to safeguard canals and rivers, which are vital to our health. Some of the craft had come 278 miles, passing through 172 locks, quite an achievement. Why was it not widely reported? A sign of a healthy society is that it pays attention to peaceful protest. Even if we don't protest we can do our bit by not wasting water (it comes out of the tap too easily) and not using drains for items (eg medicines, oils, wet wipes) the treatment works can't handle.

The need to achieve zero carbon is well-known, for ourselves and for the sake of younger generations. So it is encouraging to see that the Let's Go Zero campaign has helped thousands of schools to inform and inspire pupils about combating climate change. Since 2020 the campaign has helped those schools to make over 80,000 tonnes of annual CO₂ savings, financially also very worthwhile. Something to cheer.

On 7 June our work party met at The Glade to clear encroaching vegetation from footpaths for the benefit of walkers. Our next work party is at **10am on 5 July** at Hurston Warren SSSI (meet at the Warren off Golf Club Road) clearing highly invasive Himalayan Balsam and bracken. We are well into the Balsam bashing season, having spent Thursday afternoons in June at the work, which continues in July. Gardening clothes, gloves and wellies are suggested, other equipment is provided. A welcome cup of coffee at half time and chat helps the process.

STORRINGTON THEN & NOW FXHIBITION

Storrington's MP, Andrew Griffith, opened the *Then* and *Now* exhibition at the Storrington Museum on Saturday 31 May to mark its 25th anniversary and praised the museum's volunteers for preserving a legacy of local history and heritage for the community.



The exhibition, and its associated new book launch, presents an up to date photographic history of the fabric of Storrington. The idea began with the books of the late Florence Greenfield which included photographs of the village from the 1860's to the 1970's. Florence once lived at Forge House in Church Street and some local people still remember her fondly as Miss Greenfield, the schoolteacher.

Storrington's Camera Club has been actively working with the Museum in helping to bring this exhibition and book to life, some fifty years later, by cleaning up the historic images and producing new photographs. The images show side by side comparisons of notable places in the village, showing how the village has changed and looks today. Accompanying text provides supplementary information to highlight the differences.

While the Exhibition has now finished, the 75 page book on Storrington Then & Now is available at the Museum.

Museum Chairman, Stuart Duncan, welcomed everyone to the exhibition, also attended by volunteers, visitors, the parish council, the High Sheriff of West Sussex Dr Tim Fooks, Horsham District Council's Chairman Tony Bevis, and local county councillor Paul Marshall.

In his words of welcome to open the exhibition, Andrew Griffith said:

"Our history is so important. It belongs to all of us. This exhibition and book are a wonderful example of giving us a connection to the past, both in in the physical built environment, but also in the memories that so many have captured in words. It is an incredibly important legacy and gives a sense of pride to those who live here.

"I commend the efforts of everyone who have brought everything together for the exhibition for us all to see. I hope more people will take the time to visit and learn a little more about Storrington's past and present and feel that same sense of pride for their community."

High Sherriff Tim Fooks expressed similar thanks to the organisers of the Exhibition and book launch and highlighted the importance of local history in shaping community identity - past, present and future. He referenced the origin of Storrington's name from the Domesday Book and the story of the storks' disappearance due to agricultural changes.

He encouraged the celebration of the successful re-establishment of storks through efforts by the Knepp Estate and acknowledged Storrington's designation as the UK's first European Stork Village.

He also encouraged the audience to volunteer for the Museum and join the Camera Club to ensure continued accessibility and community involvement. There was also a light-hearted note of the High Sheriff's historic role in raising taxes, by inviting regular donations to support the Museum's ongoing work in the present day.


Sept 9 Very hot and bright

Arolo

Left Arolo this m. at 7 and soon commenced a severe zig-zag ascent, which continued without intermission for four hours – we were drawn by 6 horses. The conductor gave us up his seat for 3 francs apiece, so we enjoyed thoroughly the wonderful view and the marvels of engineering which have carried so good a road over so bad a pass. At last we entered a cleft in the bare rocks, and soon reached the summit where stands a Posthouse and Hospice: the view from here is very confined, but grandly desolate, no vegetation whatever, and a dark mountain tarn or two, which supply the Tessin on the one side and the Reuss on the other. This road was opened in 1832, but nearly destroyed in '34 and '39. The height of the summit is 6,808 feet (Snowdon is 3,590).

Lucerne

The descent is tame as far as Andermatt – after passing which you get a grand dash and rush of the Reuss thro' the gorge spanned by the Devil's Bridge and from this point down to Flüelen, situated on the lake of Lucerne, every mile is exquisitely beautiful, increasing in richness and fertility and colour, and possessing much historical interest from the deeds of William Tell – whose statue faces the little marketplace of Altdorf and the battles of the French and Austrians in 1799.



The rest of our journey was done by steamboat, down the lake Lucerne, which fully came up to my expectations – the arm down which we came from Flüelen to Brunnen being the most beautiful of the whole. The mountains slope sheer down into the lake and are well clothed, to the water's edge.

Vier Waldensee

Lucerne lake 1404 above sea level.

The 4 cantons which border are Uri, Unterwalden, Schwiste and Lucerne.

Sunday 10 Very fine and warm.

Attended service at the Lutheran church at 11.00 and 3.30. Some 300 in the am. and 150 aft. They say 6 or 700 are sometimes here. The minister, a Mr White who preached two rather ordinary sermons from Matth V and Revn i.18. Saw the Robertsons in church and had some tea with them in evg. They live in a nice house some little way up overlooking the lake, opposite Mt Pilatus.

Visited Thorvaldsen's famous lion – carved from the living rock, commemorating the heroic defence made by the Swiss guard of Louis XVI in the revolution: the motto:

Helvetiorum fidei ac virtuti

The figure is most noble, and the attitude and expression very touching – he lies with his right paw on a shield bearing the fleur de lis, and a spear broken off in his side together with the expression of anguish – dignified – on his face, declares him to be Faithful unto Death

Sept 11 Monday Very fine and warm.

Left Lucerne by the train for Olten, Berne, Thun, thus performing 3 sides of a parallelogram, the Alps being the unpassable fourth. The Hotel Belle Vue is particularly well situated, being in command of the town and lake – it has an English Chapel in the grounds, and a sort of summer house at a slight elevation from which you may get a capital view of the snowy Bernese Alps – the Jungfrau being Queen – next to her the Blüemlis and a bird's eye view of the town, which with its parted river and picturesque pepperbox fort rising as a boss to the shield of which the inn is joined by the mountains – is very beautiful, particularly under the setting sun, as we saw it. Fell in with an amusing old gentleman, who is taking his first holiday at 60 years old; he has but lately retired from his post as registrar of Doctor's Commons in a government pension. He has been abroad three years and is now anxious to return to England and roast beef (Charles Dyke).

Sept 12 Tue Fine, warm and bright, one thundershower at Olten.

Nearly all day in the melancholy Swiss railway; slow, crowded and dirty, add to this unpunctual.

Thun-Bala

Went into Berne early from Thun, and found it was market day; saw in consequence much rural costumes; and beasts and feathered fowl. The streets are arched something like Chester, and everywhere we turned we were fairly clean - the famous view of the Oberland from the Münster Platz was denied us but we saw the great weir over which the Aar rushes, the dreadfully Protestant Cathedral possessing no interest whatever except some coloured glass and a fairly carved porch, representing the 10 Virgins and the Last Judgement, and the Bears – which were very grotesque and amusing. There are Bears everywhere, carved in wood in every conceivable posture, natural and absurd, moulded in bronze, cut in stone guarding the city gates, and rampant on the colours borne by the Canton of Berne – the legend is that the city was founded by a man who had killed a bear on the spot on which it now stands. We came to Olten and passed the Jura by grand tunnel, some 2600 yards long (6 min in passing to Bale, and I am now writing this at the great hotel of the Trois Rois on the banks of the Rhine.

Sept 13 Wednesday Fine and warm.

Miss Veasey's birthday. A day of unwearied travel. 325 miles we have passed over today between 9am and 9.30pm by the Chemin de Fer de l'Est from Basle to Paris. The country we passed thro' is excessively uninteresting, large rolling plains with here and there a boundary of hills; very few trees and thinly populated. The dust lay white in the carriage, and our annual measure of dirt must have been eaten by the time we arrived here this evening. We were punctual to a minute all the way throu' and went at express English pace. Put up at the Louvre.

Sept 14 As yesterday.

With D.H. Hodgkinson doing nothing particular – lunched with him at his little place in the Rue Penthiévre – and was introduced to H. Riant who has picked up English marvellously tho' by none of the usual means, Dined at Tissot's, Potage au Bisque, saumon au Hollandaise, Boeuf à la mode, Meringues glacées – and other good things.

Sept 15 Friday

After a pleasant morning with two old Huntingdonians. V and I separated, he for the S.E.R, I for the L.B. and S.C.R. My route was most prosperous – the sea like a mill pond – had very pleasant companions in Mr and Mrs Jones of somewhere near Bury – who know F.G.V. - and nobody was at all ill. Sleep at the Hotel here this evening and pronounce it a very poor place indeed.

Sept 16 As yesterday. Very hot.

Return home by Brighton, calling on my old friend Saumurez Smith en route – reach the Rectory by sundown. I am welcomed by my mother and Emmie.

At the May meeting we enjoyed a talk by Andrew Humphris, the Head Gardener at Parham. Andrew started off by describing his background as a gardener; his father John was his gardening mentor, and throughout Andrew's childhood held several significant posts, such as Head Gardener at Borde Hill and Sutton Place, and became the President of the Professional Gardeners Guild, where he started a training scheme. He received the RHS Victoria Medal of Honour, the highest award in UK professional horticulture. The young Andrew was therefore surrounded by wonderful gardens and had an expert to discuss and share gardening ideas with.

After previous roles including at Savile Garden, Biddulph, Woollaton Old Hall, and West Lodge Estate, Andrew was appointed as Head Gardener at Parham in January 2021. Parham has been open to the public since 1948; the gardens are renowned for the four-acre Walled Garden, and herbaceous borders, and traditionally the house always has cut flowers from the garden in every room.

There had been an ongoing problem with bindweed for some time, and the opportunity to start to tackle it began during lockdown in 2020. However, it became clear that a radical approach was required. Andrew drew up a 5-year plan, and the family and directors of Parham supported his proposals. This meant a degree of disruption, with beds left fallow, but was considered the right approach to fully address the issue. The plan is now in its fifth year, and the gold border is now fallow, the last area to be treated.

The evening finished with light refreshments and a raffle.

Exciting Finish to President's Match



At the nearby Knepp Wilding Estate, the majestic White Stork deservedly took centre stage on our TV screens. The BBC did an excellent job featuring



the storks and also how the pigs and other large animals tell the story of Knepp's achievements for landscape restoration at scale. If you missed the BBC1 television programme on 25 May, grab yourself a cuppa and tune into iPlayer (Countryfile, Storrington).




With a wingspan of over 2 metres and its orange beak and matching legs offset against their distinct white body with black wings, it is a bold and eye-catching bird, even when viewed high in the sky soaring the thermals.

Since 2016 the White Stork Project introduced injured birds from Poland into the UK and they are now enjoying a revival. The continued breeding success in the south-east at Knepp and Wadhurst Park means we can soon expect storks to join

the dots from Knepp through to Storrington. The village is surrounded by suitable habitat, protected by internationally recognised wetlands and the National Park along the South Downs. These birds already linger and forage in the Arun Valley. Indeed, storks and Storrington are intricately linked. In Old English, *Estorcheton* or *Storca-tūn* likely pointed to storks being around 'town'. It will be no surprise if the storks once again make this area their home. Our job in 'Storkington' is to offer the storks a warm welcome.

What a privilege to re-discover these birds through Knepp's White Stork Project with its technology and scientific insights. We can all be part of this movement by reporting our sightings when they land in the vicinity, follow their intimate behaviour in the summer on the LIVE webcam, and track their journey as they cross the continents. And so we get to share the daily lives of this iconic bird alongside ours, all for free!

With your help and citizen data we can re-



Now that Storrington, together with Knepp Wildland, has been crowned a European Stork Village, we are committed each year to celebrate the safe return of the white stork after its amazing migratory journey to Africa. A festival will be hosted by the Storrington & Sullington Parish Council on behalf of its residents. What an honour. We have all heard of the War of the Roses and that they ended with the Henry VII and the Tudors coming to rule the England and Wales; but what caused them and what happened during them? This talk will explain all.

STORRINGTON NEIGHBOURHOOD WARDENS

We are already halfway through the year, so we thought we would give a recap of the highlights and some of the events so far.

This year Storrington celebrated its new status as the UK's first European Stork Village, a joint designation with Knepp Wildland. Storrington hosted a free White Stork and Nature Revival Festival that was a great success and enjoyed by everyone. This will now be a yearly event.

STORRINGTON PRIMARY SCHOOL




The summer term at primary school is always busy and filled with exciting experiences for the children, and at Storrington Primary School we go above and beyond to enhance the provision for the children that attend here.





WEATHER WATCH

What a remarkable spring 2025 turned out to be with May continuing for the most part with bountiful sunshine, dry conditions and warm temperatures, especially by day. In a period from the 26 February to 21 May, only 36mm of rain was measured in our area and 21mm of that fell in one



day, the 21 April. Overall, across England, the recent spring was the warmest and sunniest on record, the result of persistent high pressure.



May had no measurable rain until the 11th and began with the highest May Day temperature ever measured in the UK of 29.3°C at Kew Gardens. At my Heath Common weather station outside Storrington I measured just shy of 27°C. May rainfall was around half the average for May and was the driest May since 2020

when I recorded just 2.8mm. I have a weather instrument called a Piché evaporimeter which measures evaporation and, during May, 81mm of

water evaporated from the glass tube whereas only 28mm of actual rain fell. This discrepancy was the result of the exceptionally sunny conditions and the high day temperature values. No wonder the ground dried out and cracks appeared in our fields and gardens. Dust coated my car frequently during the month blown from fields and local quarries.

Whilst it was warm by day with 11 days exceeding 21 °C (70 °F) clear nighttime skies made it quite chilly around dawn, and I measured on my sandy soil 12 grass frosts, but air frost



was absent measured at the standard height of 1.25 metres or 4 feet. There was no snow, sleet or hail but a thunderstorm occurred on the 21 st. The last day of the month ended on a sunny warm note, but on the other side of the Downs persistent, chilly fog shrouded the coast that disappointed the day trippers. It made me think of Kipling's poem Sussex which has the lines:

Here the sea-fogs lap and cling And here, each warning each. The sheep-bells and the ship-bells ring Along the hidden beach.

SOUTH DOWNS PROBUS

Our speaker for the lunch at The George and Dragon was Frank Hurst, which is the literary name for the author and ex-HM Customs investigator from West Chiltington. His subject was Drug Smuggling – the Secret History. If it sounds interesting, it was.

He began with a background to smuggling in general which took us back to medieval times and then up to the more modern day. It appears some famous literary stars were involved in working for the Revenue, including Geoffrey Chaucer, John Dryden and Robert Burns. In the 18th century, the violence of the South Coast based Hawkhurst Gang was so extreme it finally stirred the authorities into action. But drug smuggling is a more recent activity and as usual was brought about by the opportunity for criminals to make money. There have been some notable smugglers in our time. Until his imprisonment and eventual death in 2016, Welshman Howard Marks once controlled cannabis smuggling on a global scale. Khun Sa, a Burmese warlord, orchestrated South East Asian heroin distribution for decades and was never captured. There appeared to be two main methods of smuggling drugs; firstly by avoidance and secondly by concealment. The latter may involve cling-filming it to your body (pretty funny), hiding it under a wig, or secreting it under the plaster of a not-broken leg. And also by swallowing no end of condoms filled with the powder... 282 was the record! Could be fatal of course! Avoiding the authorities often required speed boats and fast planes, even submarines and presumably now, drones. Frank had had some amusing experiences with people you would never have expected to be involved but were caught up in his stories. A very good speaker, we all enjoyed.



Later in May, a group of us set off for Bignor Park, south of Pulborough. The first wet day for ages but we were brightened up by the tour of the house and then of the garden. The house visit was personally guided by the owner who has lived there since 2010 with his family. The house and estate have been in his family since 1926 but has a much older origin going back to the deer park of the Arundel Estate and rich Cornish tin mine owners. We were shown the range of paintings of ancestors and previous owners, many of whom were great characters. A lot of the furniture had a French theme and had been collected by one wife with connections to Talleyrand of French Revolution fame! We strayed leisurely through the entrance hall and the dining room, then the lounge and into the library where, amongst the books, we were confronted by a magnificent set of drums and a grand piano. The owner explained he is really a composer of pastoral music! He was a charming man and we enjoyed his company. After that we were left to wander around the garden the first part of which was walled and with a sea of box hedging; we hoped it doesn't get the caterpillar or the virus! It was an informal garden in which you could happily spend a relaxing time, preferably on a sunny day!

Following that excursion, we retired to The Squire and Horse at Bury for another exemplary meal. What larks!






