



## THE SACRAMENT OF THE PRESENT MOMENT

As I sit at my bureau writing, there's already an autumnal nip in the air in the mornings despite it still being August. My garden is also ahead of itself and things which

would normally flower a month from now are almost over. And yet I love the changing seasons which somehow seem to reflect the chapters and repeated rhythms in the procession of our lives.

Amidst these blessings contemporary society drives us forwards, persuading us that the next thing and the next thing will always be better.

The French Jesuit Priest Fr Jean Pierre de Caussade (1675-1751) wrote his Abandonment to Divine Providence, also known as the Sacrament of the Present Moment, at Nancy. A sacrament - an expression of God's love for us in creation. In his treatise he describes how blessings are neither to be found behind us or in front of us but now in the present moment if we can only dare to still ourselves, to shut out the white noise of our lives and be truly present, because it is in the present moment that we witness God active in our lives in the power of love.

The gentle and generous discipline of being truly present can often seem out of reach amongst the pressures of our lives. But autumn and the cathedral of nature can allow us to rediscover the sacrament of the present moment.

I love the autumn harvest of joyful apples, blackberries and sloes. And soon the leaves will turn to their golden hue and begin to fall.

I commend to you a walk out into the woods as the leaves begin to fall and still yourselves. Take a moment to delight in the coolness of the soft, damp earth beneath your feet, witness the play of light upon the trees and your face and the music of the breeze upon the leaves and you will begin to hear them fall. It is at this moment that you will have begun to rediscover the sacrament of the present moment. A spiritual discipline and focus that transforms our experiences, not only of the world but also, importantly, with those we encounter and accompany along the way.



## THE SEASON OF CREATION

September marks the beginning of the Season of Creation, a period of reflection and prayer for the environment. It ends on 4 October, the Feast of St Francis of Assisi, the patron Saint of ecology, beloved of many Christian denominations. It's an opportunity to give thanks for God's gift of creation and to renew our commitment to caring for our planet home. Throughout the month-long celebration, the world's 2.2 billion Christians come together to care for our common home.




Every year, the Season of Creation ecumenical steering committee comes up with a theme to help churches around the world

strengthen our united response during this shared season of reflection and action. A Rocha is part of this steering committee. A Rocha UK is a Christian charity working to protect and restore the natural world and committed to equipping Christians and churches in the UK to care for the environment. See https://arocha.org.uk.

The official Season of Creation theme for 2025 is Peace with Creation.

So let us pray together for our environment and get involved, in any small way, in helping to preserve our precious world.

On 29 November 1979, Pope John Paul II declared Francis the patron saint of ecology. On 28 March 1982, John Paul II said that Francis' love and care for creation was a challenge for contemporary Catholics and a reminder "not to behave like dissident predators where nature is concerned, but to assume responsibility for it, taking all care so that everything stays healthy and integrated, so as to offer a welcoming and friendly environment even to those who succeed us". Wise words indeed!



## **NEW** CELEBRATORY HYMN


The Director of Music at St Mary's Church, Storrington, Stephen Bloxham, has written a hymn to mark the 950 years of the Diocese of Chichester. He recalls how he had come back from a church service and immediately started to frantically write themes of the hymn on a back of a Saga Cruise envelope! He had been inspired by Bishop Ruth's sermon at the Deanery Confirmation Service about how we need to be confident to tell and live out our faith boldly. He shares the text of the hymn and some of reasoning behind the text and music.

The hymn is in praise of God for the diversity of Sussex landscape; the history of the Christian faith in Sussex brought to the people by Bishop Wilfred. The hymn is set to Sussex, a traditional English melody adapted by Ralph Vaughan Williams (1872 -1958), who gathered many Sussex folk tunes for hymns published in the English Hymnal in 1906. Stephen decided to dedicate the hymn to the service of all the retired clergy of men and women with Permission to Officiate in the Diocese of Chichester. Stephen says, "Many come to serve in this diocese to 'retire', but they bring so much richness to the spiritual life of the diocese and individual parishes, particularly in times of interregnum".

The hymn celebrates faith in all places where Christian people are encouraged to share their faith, particularly with those who have no Christian context or church contact. The hymn also reflects the penitential aspects of our Christian journey through the ages where power and schemes of the world, including history of abuse, have clouded the goodness of the good news of the gospel in Sussex. Stephen urges people to go and visit the current exhibition of faith in the Cathedral that has been carefully curated by the Canon Treasurer, Revd Vanessa Baron, with an excellent timeline of events in Christianity and the world.

Stephen also wanted to celebrate those who have come to this diocese over the years, particularly refugees from overseas during conflicts (eg Hans Feibusch) who contributed to the art, music, theology, and activism in the diocese, and the country at large. Also to all who have richly contributed to art across Sussex, particularly the inspiration of Vanessa Bell and Duncan Grant at Berwick Church, and in the cathedral at Chichester during the tenure of Dean Walter Hussey.

The popular trope of the prayer of St Richard of Chichester is included in the penultimate verse and the hymn concludes with a simple doxology.

#### **Local heroes**

So, here we are in September and it's autumnal, and naturally in churches all over we're thinking about harvest festivals because this is the time we celebrate the work of our farmers, and our gardens and allotments are full of produce. Do you have a glut of plums, runner beans, tomatoes? No space in the freezer and no inclination to make jam or pickle? My local heroes and this month's eco champions can come to your rescue! I'm talking about the Community Market.

A bit of history first; the Community Market started in 1943 as a WI market. WI markets actually date back to 1919 but were particularly important during the long period of rationing during and after the Second World War. They enabled people to sell excess produce from all the "dig for victory" activities in an era before efficient refrigeration, and ensured a more even distribution of food in short supply. Fast forward to 2025 and we still have a great resource in our Village, but you can get rather more than just someone's excess beetroot!



## When and where?

Every Friday morning, opening at 9.30am in Storrington Village Hall (near the Tesco garage).

## What?

In keeping with its origins, one of the market's most popular stalls is the home-baked goods stall. I am particularly addicted to the Viennese Whirl biscuits, plus a home-made quiche saves cooking. The stall also sells cakes, scones, and savouries, all baked less than a mile away. In addition, there's locally produced honey and jams. You can usually get fresh eggs at the market and, most recently, there's a new stall selling Asian cuisine. No need to go hungry!

Whatever fresh vegetables and fruit are brought along on the day are sold alongside plants on another stall. In fact, the market has several suppliers of plants, so no need to spend a fortune at the garden centre.



If you enjoy seed sowing, then home-collected seeds are often available for free.

Stuck for a card or a present? Two or three people produce beautiful home-made cards for every occasion. It's my 'go to' place for a birthday or anniversary card. And as for presents, there's a whole range of hand-



crafted items from purses, to jewellery, to wooden items. You're bound to find something for everyone here.

If the saving in food miles and production costs isn't green enough for you, you can pick up a bargain from the second-hand clothing rail, the bric-a-brac table or the bookstall. You can recycle your soft plastics or get your scissors sharpened (on the first Friday of each month).

Finally, to pamper yourself, indulge in a natural beauty product from one of the stalls or a cup of tea or coffee and a biscuit from the café.

#### Who?

The market is run by volunteers and is self-supporting. Some suppliers came along and enjoy the atmosphere of the market; others deliver their goods and come back later to take away any unsold items.

## How do you get involved?

You can volunteer. The tasks are not onerous, and the camaraderie is great. You can be an occasional seller, leaving produce to be sold on the day; just bring it into the Village Hall on a Friday morning by 9.15am. Or, you may want your own stall; either way, contact Katie by phone or text on 07909 681884.

The Community Market is a real asset for the Village; let's keep it going for another 80+ years.

## STORRINGTON & SULLINGTON - REFLECTIONS OF THE PAST

## REVD HENRY PALMER AT SULLINGTON - PART 39

Why were Mr Palmer and his mother so against the match? It may be appropriate here to say something about G.C.G's heritage. He was the son of George Gibson, Deputy Lieutenant of Sussex

In 1825, George John Gibson purchased Sandgate Cottage. The family was armigerous, tracing their ancestry back to Oliver Cromwell. By 1830 G.J.G. had enlarged the cottage, which at the time of his purchase had already had the additions of "domestic edifices, coach house, stabling, pleasure gardens and kitchen garden". It had become, with the addition of more land, an estate which continued to grow with G.J.G's purchase of surrounding land as it became available. Sandgate had already cost £5,431.13.6d by 1839, when he acquired enclosure allotments from the Duke of Norfolk's trustees, of Heath Common, Warminghurst Common, the Longbury Hill area. The 1840 Tithe Map shows that he then owned 740a 3r 7p and the estate was still growing in Washington, Hampers Barn and yard and a plantation. In the following years he had spent a further £20,722 for land at Thakeham, Danehill Farm, Snapes Farm, Combeland Farm, with their connected expenses.

George John Gibson died in 1860, followed within two months by his son and heir, George Carew Gibson. The next heir to this great estate was still a minor, George Carew Carew-Gibson, born in 1842. There were two younger sisters, Catherine b.1845, and Bertha b.1846, and an elder sister, Sidney Elizabeth b.1842. The baby of the family was Frederick b.1848. The Rev. Henry Palmer's often-mentioned friend, G.C.G, attained his majority and assumed control of his inheritance in 1864, as a very wealthy eligible young bachelor. He already knew the lady he wanted to marry and lost no time in courting the Rector's elder sister in earnest, Emmie b.1834, regardless of the fact that she was 9 years older than himself, and had one broken engagement behind her. There is some thought that he may have tried to attract her interest before in his youth, as an undated poem of some 10 verses, found among a collection of Gibson correspondence, describes. It was in his hand, had been folded small and endorsed on the outside, "Dedicated to Miss Emily Palmer", entitled, "A tale of Misery founded on fact."

"Pity the sorrows of a young old man Whose breaking heart twice brought him to your door Whose sighs are lengthened to their longest span Oh give relief – one smile – he asks no more

Hard is the fate of the despised [here are 2 ink blots, swallow [?]] Where first entranced I stood without the door No pampered menial, but alas disdains Drove me from joys in prospect I foresaw

Should I reveal the sources of my grief If soft humanity e'er touched your breast Your heart would not withhold the kind relief And tears of pity could not be repressed

In former days my quoits were dear to me My country knows how widely spread my fame From cricket bat the balls flew merrily And valleys far resounded with my name

But now misfortune sad now I repine A blighted being in the state you see The light of beauty on my path did shine And I became a child of misery

A tender girl I saw I dearly loved She seemed the fairest I had ever seen To tell my love my heart was deeply moved One day I sought her in the shady air

The thrilling song within the room I heard In Ecstasies I listened near the door A smothered laugh and then a whispered word Next reached my Ears; she said "I hear the Bore" Madly I rushed into the verdant field My quoits once loved I threw in wild despair My skill was gone – my fate in life was sealed Alone, unloved, its many ills to bear

But once again I ventured to that spot The door where first I stood with listening Ear Her voice I heard and sadder still my lot A man replied, who proudly called her "dear"

O pity the sorrows of a young old man Whose beating heart twice brought him to your door Whose sighs are lengthened to their longest span Oh give relief – one smile. I ask no more.

We do not know whether Emmie ever read the poem, but she seems to have been aware of the boy's attentions and did not respond kindly. Her adventures in Gibraltar described in her letters and on the voyage home suggest a flirtatious attitude. What changed her mind about her young admirer? We cannot but reflect that he had now unexpectedly become a very wealthy owner of a great estate.

Before all this disturbance to the Rector's domestic harmony, he had been engaged with the national upheaval caused by the illness and death of Lord Palmerston, the Prime Minister. The past two decades had been a period of mainly quiet Whig government, dominated by the popular figure of 'Old Pam' who was a sportsman, whose view was that a British subject was civis Romanus with the British fleet at his back. He gave voice to the popular feeling of Britain taking a stand against foreign despots – Austria, Russia, Naples and Rome, and at home regarded himself as responsible to public opinion, rejecting the influence of the Court, the Queen and Prince Consort and sometimes even his colleagues, which appealed to the middle classes, even though he was opposed to the extension of the franchise. With his great popularity in the country and the House, there was little domestic turmoil. His time was one of peace and prosperity when nothing seemed to matter very much except for the hiatus of the Crimean War, of which he oversaw carefully selected news, although William Russell was the first war correspondent whose reports enraged the generals, accusing him of giving away military secrets to the enemy. The real hero emerging from the conflict was Florence Nightingale, who exposed the incompetence of the high command and staff work typified by the loss of life and starvation of the troops through the efficiencies of the commissariat and lack of medical supplies, although the British fleet was in Balaclava Harbour, a mere six miles away, but supplies were not being sent up to the front. Army Reform, however, would be deferred for another dozen years after Pam's death. He retained the old Regency attitudes and was against the wholesale abandonment of government patronage and jobbery to a Board of Examiners.

Lord Palmerston's period was one of calm, everything was safe and prosperous – that came to an end with his death. Mr Palmer's diary records on October 28, "The papers were full of accounts of Pam's funeral. The pretentious descriptions being plentifully interspersed with reflections sentimental and moral and even my hairdresser described the rain which fell just as the coffin was being lowered into the grave as 'the elements dropping a tear over his grave'".

That seems to be all Mr Palmer thought worth recording of the Prime Minister's passing and the end of an era. The entry was immediately followed by "Emmie and D.G. [pupil] dined at Sandgate today, the latter after shooting at Cobden where 7 brace of birds fell before him." It was not the only artillery reported by the Rector. "Were startled by what appeared to be very heavy firing today between 1.30-2.15. Wind S.E. and apart from the distinct discharge at intervals of 5 and 10 mins, much cannonading was heard towards Portsmouth: it was quite enough to shake one window and the house generally when we were at dinner." If he found out what it was all about, he does not say.

# PETWORTH HERITAGE OPEN DAYS 20 and 21 September

Heritage Open Days are here! England's largest festival of history, heritage and culture kicks off on the weekend of 20 & 21 September with over 5,000 museums, factories, manor houses, breweries, gardens and everything in between opening their doors and sharing their stories... all for FREE.

Andrew Gaunt spoke to the Club in July on the role and work of Department for Environmental

Food & Rural Affairs (DEFRA) plant quarantine service.

Andrew said that many nasties have been brought into the UK on plants entering from abroad. Sudden Oak Death came in on Rhododendron, Azalea and Viburnum plants and was first discovered in Horsham. The department's policy is to talk with the EU on the movement of plants through countries and he stressed they were not allowed to inhibit trade; they could quarantine plants but not deny access. DEFRA has several sections, and the one Andrew was part of dealt with animal and plant health, operating at airports and docks. FERA dealt with identification and advice, NIAB with seeds, and the Forestry Commission with trees. Plant Health was initiated by Queen Victoria in 1877 to prevent Colorado Beetle reaching Great Britain. Several known pests were mentioned, such as Asian Longhorned Beetle and Yellow-legged Hornets which could cause drastic damage if allowed to enter our country. Over 1400 pests and diseases have been kept at bay by the department.

Andrew was an excellent speaker and made his talk extremely interesting and answered questions as the evening progressed.

The Club's Annual Show also took place in July with trophies being presented to the class winners.

The next meeting is on **8 September** when Steve Webster will talk on Deceivers, Death Caps & Fairy Rings and the Club competition will be A Dahlia



## **Carnivorous Plants**

At the July meeting we enjoyed a talk by Don Fitzgerald, on carnivorous

Little is known about the origins of these plants, as their structure does not lend itself to fossilisation, though some seeds have been found in fossilised form. For a plant to qualify as a carnivore, it must attract, attack, and digest its prey. There are some plants which fulfil some but not all these criteria known as proto-carnivores.

True carnivores include pitcher traps, where the insect slides down into pool of digestive fluid in the bottom; flypaper traps, which use sticky mucilage to hold an insect down while the plant exudes digestive fluid over them; and snap traps, such as the well-known Venus Flytrap, which use a hair trigger system to set off the trap. Bladder traps operate by producing vacuums in small bladders so that passing insects are sucked inside when they trigger the bladder to open. Lastly there are lobster pot traps, which are easy to enter, but more difficult to leave, forcing the prey ever closer to the digestive chamber.

Don shared tips on care for these plants, most importantly, never use tap water, only rainwater or distilled water as they will die from the accretion of mineral salts found in tap water. Secondly, don't use garden compost or potting compost as they like nutrient-poor soil. Seeds and starter plants can be planted in three-parts sphagnum moss and one-part agricultural sand. They should never dry out, but kept free-draining and damp, and they are hardy with almost all tolerating an English winter outdoors.

After the talk, attendees had the opportunity to buy some of these fascinating plants. The evening finished with light refreshments and a raffle.

Next month's meeting is on 19 September when Dr Tony Booker will talk about Turmeric Plant Hunting in India.

## **AN INSPIRATIONAL STORY**

## Young Local Entrepreneur Builds Pottery Studio After Heart Attack at 22

If you'd told me two years ago I'd be running a pottery painting studio, surrounded by clay, paint, and tiny handprints, I think I would've laughed... and then needed a nap.

At 21, I was living with several chronic illnesses when I had a heart attack in June 2024. Everything changed overnight. I had to relearn how to walk and talk properly. The basics became huge milestones. It was frustrating, exhausting, and honestly really emotional. But it gave me a completely new perspective on life.





I started painting pottery during recovery. At first, it was just something calming to do. Something quiet and creative that let me focus on the moment. It became a kind of therapy, a way to feel like myself again. Slowly, what began as a personal outlet turned into something bigger.

Like pottery, I was being rebuilt piece by piece. It wasn't always neat or tidy, but it was mine. And out of that process, Pot Luck Creations was born.

It started with pottery painting. Then we added handmade ceramic keepsakes, clay imprints, fingerprint and paw print

jewellery, and custom pottery with handwriting or children's drawings. Every piece tells a story, whether it's a baby's first handprint, a beloved pet's paw, or a special message from someone you love.

One of my favourite things to do in my spare time is throw and make my own ceramics. You can find lots of these special pieces around the studio, perfect for unique gifts. I have to admit I make a huge mess when I am working with clay but it is all part of the fun. Right now visitors paint on ready-made bisqueware but soon we are hoping to offer handmade pieces for you to paint yourself. We are also planning something really fun and unique called miniature wheel throwing sessions where you can try your hand at pottery in a whole new way.

But more than anything, the studio has become a space where people come to slow down. I've met parents making keepsakes with their little ones, grandparents painting with their grandkids, and friends just enjoying a quiet afternoon with a paintbrush in hand. It's a joyful little place, filled with colour and conversation.

Running a business while managing my health hasn't been easy. There are still tough days. But this studio has brought so much joy into my life. It's given me purpose, and it's helped me connect with people in ways I never expected.





We've got more workshops and creative events coming soon, and I can't wait to see where it goes next. But I'll always be proud of how far it's come and how much heart this little space holds. So if you ever want to try something creative, make a meaningful keepsake, or just spend some time in a calm and welcoming space, you are always welcome here at Cobblestone Walk, Steyning. It's a place to be yourself and enjoy the moment.

## **WEATHER WATCH**

The 16th Century poet Edmund Spencer wrote, "Now comes July, boiling like to fire" and this was very apt this year for on the 1st Storrington reached 30°C and was the warmest day of the month. In Kent it reached just short of 35°C. Overall, July this year could best be described as warm, sunny and on the dry side. On the 2nd I enjoyed an evening visit to the summit of Chantry Hill in near perfect weather. A path took me through a field of barley. It thrives in sunshine and dry conditions, though too much heat can be detrimental.

Rainfall during the month was very variable in amount, even across our relatively small area, as it fell mostly as showers. A good example was on Sunday 6th. My wife and I went to see and enjoy the flower display at St Mary's Church, Sullington, and then on to the display of local crafts put on view in the adjacent old tithe barn. It was early afternoon and with a somewhat unsettled sky we took the car rather than walk. Some large convective clouds were developing. By midafternoon some rumbles of

thunder were heard, and they became more frequent.

This sent me outside from the craft hall along with several other visitors to view the active storm in the direction of Amberley. Slowly it moved towards us and a torrential burst of rain sent everyone scurrying inside. A brief lull in the deluge meant a soggy walk to our car in a nearby field that was used as a car park. We did not want to be marooned by any floodwater or mud. Arriving home in the Heath Common area my rain gauge showed less than 2mm of rain had fallen and virtually none was seen at Thakeham and Ashington whilst I had reports of flooding at Amberley Museum.

On the 21st further storms developed to the north of us towards the A272 and beyond bringing heavy rain and frequent lightning and thunder whilst Storrington remained dry. On the 31st again there were active storms but overall my monthly rainfall total of 50mm amounted to only 90% of the average. This made it the fifth month in a row this year with less rainfall than par. In the very north of Sussex some places measured 125mm during July.

Only two days were cooler than  $21^{\circ}$ C ( $70^{\circ}$ F) only by a fraction and 15 were warmer than  $24^{\circ}$ C( $75^{\circ}$ F). It was sustained rather than record breaking heat that made it equal with 2022 as the warmest July since



2018. Nationally it was the 5th warmest in a timescale going back over 150 years. With 15 dry days, generous amounts of sunshine, light winds and good visibility, it was often a pleasant month to get out and about. I had a nice excursion on the 28th organised by the Nature Group of the Arun Valley U3A to Woods Mill reserve at Small Dole. It is not far from Bramber and is run by the Sussex Wildlife Trust. Butterflies abounded but up above the sky was particularly interesting with examples of 'flying saucer' clouds and colourful coronas.

## Privileged to Play at Lord's

On Sunday 27 July, our Sussex Pathway juniors, Massimo Phillips and Thomas Clarke, played in two T20 matches at Lord's in a Sussex Cricket Board U13 side against a Lord's Youth U13 side. Thomas batted in the first match that Sussex won by 8 wickets and Massimo batted in the second match that the Lord's Youth side won by 5 wickets. The Sussex players were also given a tour of the grounds.

The following day, Will Morgan, playing in our U12 side, scored an unbeaten century in a match against West Wittering. Alfie Lane and Archie Sadler each took 3 wickets in the West Wittering innings.

Sussex Junior League cricket finished in July to make way for Junior Festival competitions in August. Our U13 boys finished joint top with Findon in the West Area League after winning seven of their eight matches whilst the mixed boys and girls U13 side finished third in the North Area League. Our U13 girls finished second in the West Area League despite being undefeated in their matches. Tillie Tomlinson top scored in two of the matches whilst Alice Cunningham, Lea Diana and Christie Kelly were the most successful bowlers.

Our 1st XI had victories over Worthing and Horsham but lost to Ifield. In the Worthing match, skipper Tim Laker took four wickets for just eight runs, whilst in the Horsham match Ben Murray and Douglas Sopp scored 75 and 66 runs respectively, with Tim just missing out on a half century.

Our 2nd XI overwhelmed Billingshurst but lost to Steyning and Slinfold. Frankie Brown took five Billingshurst wickets for a meagre 11 runs supported by Massimo Phillips taking three wickets in the ten wicket victory. Graham Humphries scored 65 in the Steyning match.

The Sunday XI won their only match against Barns Green when Massimo and Thomas Wroe both scored 38 runs and Justin Hayles took three wickets.

The mid-week T20 Slam side lost to Eastergate and Watersfield, Tom Fisher having to retire on 31 in the latter match.

Off the field, we achieved the Crowdfunding target of £15k to secure a matching sum from Sport England as part of our fund raising for the pavilion redevelopment project.

# **STORRINGTON** CONSERVATION SOCIETY

It has been said that weeds are only flowers in the wrong place. A reminder that many plants we uproot as weeds in our gardens are beautiful wildflowers valued by pollinating insects. But some plants are certainly in the wrong place, especially plants introduced from abroad, such as Himalayan Balsam (Impatiens Glandulifera) which thrives and crowds out native species. Too late it became clear how easily spread and harmful it is, though



now it is illegal to plant or propagate it. Other invasive species now banned are well known, such as Japanese Knotweed (Reynoutria Japonica) and Giant Hogweed (Heracleum Mantegazzianum). Also banned are New Zealand Pigmyweed (Crassula Helmsii) and Skunk Cabbage (Lysichiton Americanus). A patch of the latter was discovered and eradicated by Mick and Sue Denness when bashing balsam. It may be surprising to learn that Rhododendrons (family Ericaceae) are also rightly classified as invasive. Unless controlled, they can spread by layering. They are an example of a species, native to the Himalayas, introduced for their beauty but unaware of the consequences.

Giant Hogweed comes from the Caucasus region and was brought to the UK as an ornamental plant. Its sap is toxic to us and causes blisters.

Skunk Cabbage, so named because of its smell. It was introduced from North America in 1901, again as an ornamental plant. Inevitably it spread to marshy areas across the UK, and is toxic if eaten.

New Zealand Pigmyweed is an aquatic plant which thrives in pool margins, grows rapidly forming dense carpets but does not die back in winter so needs to be controlled.

Japanese Knotweed is native to East Asia, crowding out other species, and is tolerant of a wide range of temperatures and drought. It has deep penetrating roots which makes eradication difficult.

These invasive plants, which have no natural enemies in this country, need our intervention if native species are to survive. Join the Conservation Society and have fun bashing the beasts!

Over several sessions throughout July and August we continued uprooting Himalayan Balsam in Hurston Warren, Monkmead Woods and Cootham Woods. Our work party met on 9 August at Dyke Farm meadow hay raking and weeding the hedge trees planted last year, providing vital habitats and corridors for small mammals and birds.

Our next work party is on **6 September at 10am** on Chantry Hill to clear more damaging scrub to preserve the chalk grassland. We meet at Greyfriars Stable, sharing transport where possible.

Gardening clothes and gloves are suggested, other equipment is provided. As ever, more hands make light work, so come and join us.





# WOODS ON PRESCRIPTION HARNESSING THE HEALING POWER OF TREES AND NATURE



The Lost Woods of the Low Weald and Downs project is offering a free wellbeing course for adults who would like to find out how nature can improve their mental health. The six weekly sessions will be held on Thursdays, 11 am to 2pm, from 4 September at Hareswith Pond near Storrington.

Karen Laver, Lost Woods team leader for project partner Action in Rural Sussex, explains more:

At times, many of us can experience feeling lonely, isolated or down. Life can throw us challenges or long-term difficulties, whereas at other times, a low mood gradually develops unexpectedly. I've definitely



had times like these. If this is you at the moment, and you're finding it hard to know how to feel more like yourself again, then you might be interested to hear that spending time in nature has been shown to reduce our stress and boost our mood.

From September, we'll be running our Woods on Prescription course at a beautiful ancient woodland near Storrington. The course of six weekly sessions is open for adults who live locally and wish to boost their sense of wellbeing.



We'll be meeting at Hareswith Pond and running activities that will help connect you with nature as well as meet new people in your community. We base our sessions on the NHS's Five Ways to Wellbeing approach, so that by the time the course ends, you'll have some practical tools for the

future. The sessions are different each week. We might be trying our hand at a woodland craft, going on a nature walk, or doing some light conservation tasks. The group always ends the session with tea and cake, and shared thoughts and experiences, along with a nature-based task for the coming week.

We've already run these courses in Haywards Heath, Henfield, Burgess Hill, and Steyning, and we've had amazing feedback. Previous participants have said:

"I've had the most beautiful time. It's something I wouldn't have thought I'd come along to, but it's been enjoyable, informative and I've learned a lot. I've loved meeting different people."

"It's got me out of the house and got me more interested in life again following an illness."


